

Introduction

Read this information carefully to learn how to operate and maintain your product properly and to avoid injury and product damage. You are responsible for operating the product properly and safely.

You may contact Toro directly at www.Toro.com for product and accessory information, help finding a dealer, or to register your product.

Whenever you need service, genuine Toro parts, or additional information, contact an Authorized Service Dealer or Toro Customer Service and have the model and serial numbers of your product ready. Figure 1 identifies the location of the model and serial numbers on the product.

This manual identifies potential hazards and has safety messages identified by the safety alert symbol (Figure 2), which signals a hazard that may cause serious injury or death if you do not follow the recommended precautions.



1. Safety alert symbol

This manual uses 2 words to highlight information. **Important** calls attention to special mechanical information and **Note** emphasizes general information worthy of special attention.

For models with stated engine horsepower, the gross horsepower of the engine was laboratory rated by the engine manufacturer in accordance with SAE J1940. As configured to meet safety, emission, and operating requirements, the actual engine horsepower on this class of lawn mower will be significantly lower.

Safety

Improperly using or maintaining this mower can result in injury. To reduce the potential for injury, comply with these safety instructions.

Toro designed and tested this mower for reasonably safe service; however, failure to comply with the following instructions may result in personal injury.

To ensure maximum safety, best performance, and to gain knowledge of the product, it is essential that you and any other operator of the mower read and understand the contents of this manual before the engine is ever started. Pay particular attention to the safety alert symbol (Figure 2) which means Caution, Warning, or Danger—"personal safety instruction." Read and understand the instruction because it has to do with safety. Failure to comply with the instruction may result in personal injury.

General Lawn Mower Safety

The following instructions have been adapted from the ISO standard 5395.

This cutting machine is capable of amputating hands and feet and throwing objects. Failure to observe the following safety instructions could result in serious injury or death.

Training

- Read the instructions carefully. Be familiar with the controls and the proper use of the equipment.
- Never allow children or people unfamiliar with these instructions to use the mower. Local regulations can restrict the age of the operator.
- Keep in mind that the operator or user is responsible for accidents or hazards occurring to other people or their property.
- Understand explanations for all pictograms used on the mower or in the instructions.

Gasoline

WARNING-Gasoline is highly flammable. Take the following precautions.

- Store fuel in containers specifically designed for this purpose.
- Refuel outdoors only and do not smoke while refueling.
- Add fuel before starting the engine. Never remove the cap of the fuel tank or ad gasoline while the engine is running or when the engine is hot.
- If gasoline is spilled, do not attempt to start the engine but move the mower away from the area of spillage and avoid creating any source of ignition until gasoline vapors have dissipated.
- Replace all fuel tank and container caps securely.

Preparation

- While mowing, always wear substantial footwear and long trousers. Do not operate the equipment when barefoot or wearing open sandals.
- Thoroughly inspect the area where the equipment is to be used and remove all stones, sticks, wires, bones and other foreign objects.
- Before using, always visually inspect to see that guards, and safety devices, such as deflectors and/or grass catchers, are in place and working correctly.
- Before using, always visually inspect to see that the blades, blade bolts and cutter assembly are not worn or damaged. Replace worn or damaged blades and bolts in sets to preserve balance.

Starting

- Disengage all blade and drive clutches and shift into neutral before starting the engine.
- Do not tilt mower when starting the engine or switching on the motor, unless the mower has to be tilted for starting. In this case, do not tilt it more than

- absolutely necessary and lift only the part, which is away from the operator.
- Start the engine or switch on the motor carefully according to instructions and with feet well away from the blade(s) and not in front of the discharge chute.

Operation

- Never mow while people, especially children, or pets are nearby.
- Mow only in daylight or in good artificial light.
- Stay alert for holes in the terrain and other hidden hazards.
- Do not put hands or feet near or under rotating parts. Keep clear of the discharge opening at all times.
- Never pick up or carry a lawn mower while the engine is running.
- Use extreme caution when reversing or pulling a pedestrian controlled lawn mower towards you.
- Walk, never run.
- Slopes:
 - Do not mow excessively steep slopes.
 - Exercise extreme caution when on slopes.
 - Mow across the face of slopes, never up and down and exercise extreme caution when changing direction on slopes.
 - Always be sure of your footing on slopes.
- Use low throttle settings when engaging the traction-clutch, especially in high gears. Reduce speed on slopes and in sharp turns to prevent overturning or loss of control.
- Stop the blade if the lawn mower has to be tilted for transportation when crossing surfaces other than grass and when transporting the lawn mower to and from the area to be mowed.
- Do not operate the engine in a confined space where dangerous carbon monoxide fumes can collect.
- Stop the engine
 - whenever you leave the lawn mower.
 - before refueling.
 - before removing the grass catcher.
 - before making height adjustment unless adjustment can be made from the operator's position.
- Stop the engine and disconnect the spark-plug wire.
 - before clearing blockages or unclogging chute.

- before checking, cleaning or working on the lawn mower.
- after striking a foreign object, inspect the lawn mower for damage and make repairs before restarting and operating the lawn mower.
- if lawn mower starts to vibrate abnormally (check immediately).
- Watch out for traffic when crossing or near roadways.

Maintenance and Storage

- Keep all nuts, bolts and screws tight to be sure the equipment is in safe working condition.
- Do not use pressure cleaning equipment on machine.
- Never store the equipment with gasoline in the tank and inside a building where fumes can reach an open flame or spark.
- Allow the engine to cool before storing in any enclosure.
- To reduce the fire hazard, keep the engine, silencer, battery compartment and gasoline storage area free of grass, leaves, or excessive grease.
- Check grass catcher components and the discharge guard frequently and replace with manufacturer's recommended parts, when necessary.
- Replace worn or damaged parts for safety.
- Replace faulty silencers.
- If the fuel tank has to be drained, do this out-doors.
- Do not change the engine governor settings or overspeed the engine. Operating an engine at excessive speed can increase the hazard of personal injury.
- On multibladed lawn mowers, take care as rotating one blade may cause others to rotate.
- Be careful during adjustment of the lawn mower to prevent entrapment of the fingers between moving blades and fixed parts of the lawn mower.
- To ensure the best performance and safety, purchase only genuine Toro replacement parts and accessories. Do not use will fit parts and accessories; they may cause a safety hazard.

Sound Pressure

This unit has an equivalent continuous A-weighted sound pressure level at the operator ear of 89 dBA, based on measurements of identical machines per EN 11094 and EN 836.

Sound Power

This unit has an equivalent continuous A-weighted sound power level of 98 dBA, based on measurements of identical machines per EN 11094.

Vibration, Hand/arm


This unit does not exceed a hand/arm vibration level of 4.7 m/s², based on measurements of identical machines per EN 1033.

Safety and Instructional Decals

Important: Safety and instruction decals are located near areas of potential danger. Replace damaged decals.






1. Assembling and Unfolding the Handle

Procedure



Assembling and unfolding the handle improperly can damage the cables, causing an unsafe operating condition.

- Do not damage the cables when assembling and unfolding the handle.
- If a cable is damaged, contact an Authorized Service Dealer.
- 1. Raise the rear of the mower housing to its highest cutting height setting by moving the 2 rear cutting height levers all the way forward. Refer to Adjusting the Cutting Height in the Operation section.
- 2. Attach the handle ends to the mower housing with 2 washers and 2 handle bolts (Figure 3), but do not tighten the handle bolts.

- 3. Handle end
- 3. Rotate the handle rearward (Figure 4).



- 4. Lock the handle at your desired height. Refer to Adjusting the Handle Height in the Operation section.
- 5. Torque the handle bolts to 120 to 160 in-lb (14 to 17 N-m).
- 6. Adjust the cutting height. Refer to Adjusting the Cutting Height.

2. Installing the Starter Rope

Procedure

Pull the starter rope through the rope guide on the handle (Figure 5).



Note: To make the rope easier to install, squeeze the control bar on the handle.

3. Filling the Engine with Oil

Procedure

Your mower does not come with oil in the engine.

1. Remove the dipstick (Figure 6).



- 2. **Slowly** pour oil into the oil fill tube until the oil level reaches the Full line on the dipstick (Figure 6). **Do not overfill.** (Max. fill: 20 oz. (0.59 l), type: SAE 30 detergent oil with an API service classification of SF, SG, SH, SJ, SL, or higher.)
- 3. Install the dipstick securely.

Important: Change the engine oil after the first 5 operating hours; change it yearly thereafter. Refer to Changing the Engine Oil.




Figure 7 Self-propel model shown



Operation

Filling the Fuel Tank

Gasoline is extremely flammable and explosive. A fire or explosion from gasoline can burn you and others.

- To prevent a static charge from igniting the gasoline, place the container and/or mower directly on the ground before filling, not in a vehicle or on an object.
- Fill the tank outdoors when the engine is cold. Wipe up spills.
- Do not handle gasoline when smoking or around an open flame or sparks.
- Store gasoline in an approved fuel container, out of the reach of children.

Fill the fuel tank with fresh unleaded regular gasoline from a major name-brand service station (Figure 9).

Important: To reduce starting problems, add fuel stabilizer to the fuel all season, mixing it with gasoline less than 30 days old.




Checking the Engine Oil Level

Service Interval: Before each use or daily

1. Remove the dipstick, wipe it clean, and fully install the dipstick (Figure 10).



Remove the dipstick and check the oil level
(Figure 10). If the oil level is below the Add mark on
the dipstick, slowly pour oil into the oil fill tube to
raise the oil level to the Full mark on the dipstick.
 Do not overfill. (Max. fill: 20 oz. (0.59 l), type: SAE
30 detergent oil with an API service classification of
SF, SG, SH, SJ, SL, or higher.)

3. Install the dipstick.

Adjusting the Cutting Height

A

Adjusting the cutting height may bring you into contact with the moving blade, causing serious injury.

- Stop the engine and wait for all moving parts to stop.
- Do not put your fingers under the housing when adjusting the cutting height.

A

If the engine has been running, the muffler will be hot and can severely burn you. Keep away from the hot muffler.

Adjust the cutting height as desired. Set all four wheels to the same height.

Note: To raise the mower, move all 4 cutting height levers forward; to lower the mower, move them all rearward (Figure 11).




Adjusting the Handle Height

You may raise or lower the handle to a position comfortable for you.

Rotate the handle lock, move the handle to one of three positions, and lock the handle into position (Figure 12).




1. Handle lock


2. Handle positions

Starting the Engine

1. Pull the blade control bar to the handle (Figure 13).



2. Pull the recoil start handle (Figure 14).



Note: If the mower does not start, contact an Authorized Service Dealer.

Using the Self-propel Drive

Self-propel models only

To operate the self-propel drive, simply walk with your hands on the upper handle and your elbows at your sides, and the mower will automatically keep pace with you (Figure 15).



Stopping the Engine

Release the blade control bar (Figure 16).

Important: When you release the blade control bar, the blade should stop within 3 seconds. If it does not stop properly, stop using your mower immediately and contact an Authorized Service Dealer.




Recycling the Clippings

Your mower comes from the factory ready to recycle the grass and leaf clippings back into the lawn.

If the side discharge chute is on the mower, remove it and lock the side discharge door (refer to Removing the Side Discharge Chute) before recycling the clippings.

Important: Ensure that the rear discharge plug is securely in place. Lift up the discharge deflector and look for 2 tabs in front of the plug (Figure 17). If you do not see them, firmly push the plug in until it snaps into place (Figure 18).



1. Tabs



Bagging the Clippings

Use the grass bag when you want to collect grass and leaf clippings from the lawn.

A

A worn grass bag could allow small stones and other similar debris to be thrown in the operator's or bystander's direction and result in serious personal injury or death to the operator or bystanders.

Check the grass bag frequently. If it is damaged, install a new Toro replacement bag.

If the side discharge chute is on the mower, remove it and lock the side discharge door (refer to Removing the Side Discharge Chute) before bagging the clippings.



Installing the Grass Bag

1. Route the starter rope around the lower rope guide (Figure 19).

Note: The lower rope guide releases the starter rope when you pull the recoil start handle.

2. Raise and hold up the discharge deflector (Figure 20).





- 1. Discharge deflector

Removing the Grass Bag

1. Route the starter rope around the lower rope guide (Figure 22).

Note: The lower rope guide releases the starter rope when you pull the recoil start handle.

- 2. Raise and hold up the discharge deflector.
- 3. Lift the grass bag up by the handle off the notches.
- 4. Install the rear discharge plug (Figure 23).




Important: Ensure that the rear discharge plug is securely in place. Lift up the discharge deflector and look for 2 tabs in front of the plug (Figure 24). If you do not see them, firmly push the plug in until it snaps into place.




1. Tabs

Side-discharging the Clippings

Use the side discharge for cutting very tall grass.

Important: Ensure that the rear discharge plug is securely in place. Lift up the discharge deflector and look for 2 tabs in front of the plug (Figure 25). If you do not see them, firmly push the plug in until it snaps into place (Figure 26).



1. Unlock the side discharge door (Figure 27).



2. Lift open the side discharge door (Figure 28).



3. Install the side discharge chute and close the door onto the chute (Figure 29).



Important: Lock the side discharge door after you close it (Figure 30).



Operating Tips

General Mowing Tips

- Clear the area of sticks, stones, wire, branches, and other debris that the blade could hit.
- Avoid striking solid objects with the blade. Never deliberately mow over any object.
- If the mower strikes an object or starts to vibrate, immediately stop the engine, disconnect the wire from the spark plug, and examine the mower for damage.
- For best performance, install a new blade before the cutting season begins.
- Replace the blade when necessary with a Toro replacement blade.

Cutting Grass

- Cut only about a third of the grass blade at a time. Do not cut below the 2-inch (51 mm) setting unless the grass is sparse or it is late fall when grass growth begins to slow down. Refer to Adjusting the Cutting Height.
- When cutting grass over 6 inches (15 cm) tall, mow at the highest cutting height setting and walk slower; then mow again at a lower setting for the best lawn appearance. If the grass is too long, the mower may plug and cause the engine to stall.
- Mow only dry grass or leaves. Wet grass and leaves tend to clump on the yard and can cause the mower to plug or the engine to stall.



Wet grass or leaves can cause serious injury if you slip and contact the blade. Mow only in dry conditions.

- Alternate the mowing direction. This helps disperse the clippings over the lawn for even fertilization.
- If the finished lawn appearance is unsatisfactory, try one or more of the following:

- Replace the blade or have it sharpened.
- Walk at a slower pace while mowing.
- Raise the cutting height on your mower.
- Cut the grass more frequently.
- Overlap cutting swaths instead of cutting a full swath with each pass.
- Set the cutting height on the front wheels one notch lower than the rear wheels. For example, set the front wheels at 2-1/4 inches (60 mm) and the rear wheels at 2-3/4 inches (70 mm).

Cutting Leaves

- After cutting the lawn, ensure that half of the lawn shows through the cut leaf cover. You may need to make more than one pass over the leaves.
- If there are more than 5 inches (13 cm) of leaves on the lawn, set the front cutting height one or two notches higher than the rear cutting height.
- Slow down your mowing speed if the mower does not cut the leaves finely enough.

Maintenance

Note: Determine the left and right sides of the machine from the normal operating position.

Recommended Maintenance Schedule(s)

Maintenance Service Interval	Maintenance Procedure	
After the first 5 hours	Change the engine oil.	
Before each use or daily	 Check the engine oil level. Ensure that the engine stops within 3 seconds after releasing the blade control bar. Clean grass clippings and dirt from under the mower. 	
Every 25 hours	Replace the blade or have it sharpened (more frequently if the edge dulls quickly).	
Every 50 hours	Change the engine oil.	
Every 100 hours	 Clean the cooling system (refer to your engine owner's manual). Replace the spark plug (refer to your engine owner's manual). 	
Before storage	Empty the fuel tank before repairs as directed and before annual storage.	
Yearly	 Replace the air filter (more frequently in dusty operating conditions). Check the spark plug (refer to your engine owner's manual). Lubricate the rear wheel gears. Refer to your Engine Operator's Manual for any additional yearly maintenance procedures. 	

Important: Refer to your Engine Operator's Manual for additional maintenance procedures.

Preparing for Maintenance

- 1. Stop the engine and wait for all moving parts to stop.
- 2. Disconnect the spark plug wire from the spark plug (Figure 31) before performing any maintenance procedure.



3. After performing the maintenance procedure(s), connect the spark plug wire to the spark plug.

Important: Before tipping the mower to change the oil or replace the blade, allow the fuel tank to run dry through normal usage. If you must tip the mower prior to running out of fuel, use a hand fuel pump to remove the fuel. Always tip the mower onto its side with the air filter up.




Tipping the mower may cause the fuel to leak. Gasoline is flammable, explosive and can cause personal injury.

Run the engine dry or remove the gasoline with a hand pump; never siphon.


Replacing the Air Filter

Service Interval: Yearly

- 1. Perform the pre-maintenance procedures; refer to Preparing for Maintenance.
- 2. Use a screw driver to open the air filter cover (Figure 32).



- 3. Replace the air filter.
- 4. Install the cover (Figure 33).



Changing the Engine Oil

Service Interval: After the first 5 hours Every 50 hours

Run the engine a few minutes before changing the oil to warm it. Warm oil flows better and carries more contaminants.

- 1. Perform the pre-maintenance procedures; refer to Preparing for Maintenance.
- 2. Remove the dipstick (Figure 34).





3. Tip the mower onto its side, with the air filter up, to drain the used oil out through the oil fill tube (Figure 35).

4. **Slowly** pour oil into the oil fill tube until the oil level reaches the Full line on the dipstick (Figure 36). **Do not overfill.** (Max. fill: 20 oz. (0.59 l), type: SAE 30 detergent oil with an API service classification of SF, SG, SH, SJ, SL, or higher.)



- 5. Install the dipstick securely.
- 6. Dispose of the used oil properly at a local recycling center.

Lubricating the Wheel Gears

Service Interval: Yearly

Self-propel models only

1. Wipe the grease fittings just inside the rear wheels with a clean rag (Figure 37).



2. Install a grease gun onto each fitting and gently apply 2 or 3 pumps of #2 multi-purpose lithium-base grease.

Replacing the Blade

Service Interval: Every 25 hours—Replace the blade or have it sharpened (more frequently if the edge dulls quickly).

Important: You will need a torque wrench to install the blade properly. If you do not have a torque wrench or are uncomfortable performing this procedure, contact an Authorized Service Dealer.


Examine the blade whenever you run out of gasoline. If the blade is damaged or cracked, replace it immediately. If the blade edge is dull or nicked, have it sharpened or replace it.

Λ

The blade is sharp; contacting the blade can result in serious personal injury.

Wear gloves when servicing the blade.

- 1. Disconnect the spark plug wire from the spark plug. Refer to Preparing for Maintenance.
- 2. Tip the mower onto its side with the air filter up.
- 3. Use a block a wood to hold the blade steady (Figure 38).



- 4. Remove the blade, saving all mounting hardware.
- 5. Install the new blade and all mounting hardware.

Important: Position the curved ends of the blade to point toward the mower housing.

6. Use a torque wrench to tighten the blade bolt to 60 ft-lb (82 N·m).

Important: A bolt torqued to 60 ft-lb (82 N·m) is very tight. While holding the blade with a block of wood, put your weight behind the ratchet or wrench and tighten the bolt securely. This bolt is very difficult to overtighten.

Cleaning the Mower

Service Interval: Before each use or daily


A

The mower may dislodge material from under the mower housing.

- Wear eye protection.
- Stay in the operating position (behind the handle) when the engine is running.
- Do not allow bystanders in the area.

For best results, clean the mower soon after you have completed mowing.

- Lower the mower to its lowest cutting height setting.
 Refer to Adjusting the Cutting Height.
- 2. Move the mower onto a flat paved surface.
- 3. Attach a garden hose that is connected to a water supply to the washout port on the mower housing (Figure 39).



1. Washout port

- 4. Turn the water on.
- 5. Start the engine and run it until there are no more clippings that come out from under the mower housing.
- 6. Stop the engine.
- 7. Shut off the water and disconnect the garden hose from the mower.
- 8. Start the engine and run it for a few minutes to dry the housing.

Storage

Store the mower in a cool, clean, dry place.

Preparing the Mower for Storage

A


Gasoline vapors can explode.

- Do not store gasoline more than 30 days.
- Do not store the mower in an enclosure near an open flame.
- Allow the engine to cool before storing it.
- 1. On the last refueling of the year, add fuel stabilizer to the fuel as directed by the engine manufacturer.
- 2. Run the mower until the engine stops from running out of fuel.
- 3. Allow the engine to run until it stops. When you can no longer start the engine, it is sufficiently dry.
- 4. Remove the wire from the spark plug and connect the wire onto the retaining post.
- 5. Remove the spark plug, add 1 oz. (30 ml) of oil through the spark plug hole, and pull the starter rope slowly several times to distribute oil throughout the cylinder to prevent cylinder corrosion during the off-season.
- 6. Loosely install the spark plug.
- 7. Tighten all nuts, bolts, and screws.

Folding the Handle

1. Rotate the handle forward (Figure 40).

Important: Route the cables to the outside of the handle knobs as you fold the upper handle.



2. To unfold the handle, refer to Assembling and Unfolding the Handle in the Setup section.

Removing the Mower from Storage

- 1. Remove the spark plug and spin the engine rapidly using the starter to blow the excess oil from the cylinder.
- 2. Install the spark plug and tighten it with a torque wrench to 15 ft-lb (20 N-m).
- 3. Connect the wire to the spark plug.
