



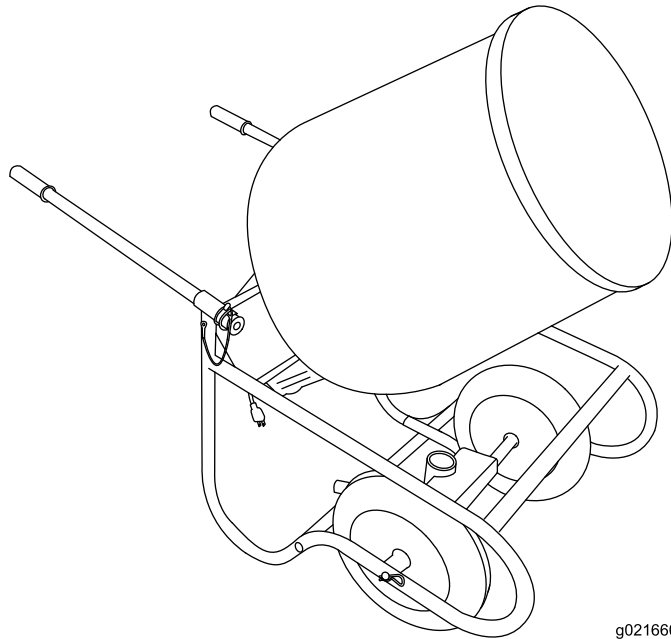

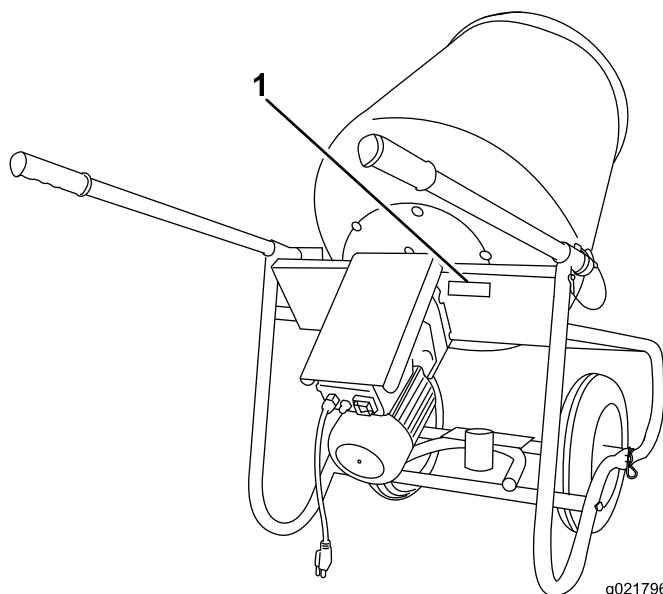

Read this information carefully to learn how to operate and maintain your product properly and to avoid injury and product damage. You are responsible for operating the product properly and safely.

Safety

Improper use or maintenance of the machine can result in injury. Preparation

- Wear appropriate clothing including hard hat, face shield, safety glasses, long pants, safety shoes, and hearing

protection. Long hair, loose clothing, or jewelry may get tangled in moving parts.

- Whenever possible, use circuits or receptacles protected with a Ground Fault Circuit Interrupter (GFCI) device.
- Inspect the electrical cords for damage. Replace the damaged cord before operating the machine.
- Inspect the electrical plug and sockets for damage. Replace the damaged electrical connector(s) before operating the machine.
- Keep electrical connectors off the ground and dry.

Operation

- Only operate in good light, keeping away from holes and hidden hazards.
- Ensure that you operate the machine in areas where there are no obstacles in close proximity to the operator. Failure to maintain adequate distance from trees, walls, and other barriers may result in injury during operation if the operator is not attentive to the surroundings. Operate the machine in areas where there is sufficient clearance for the operator to safely maneuver the machine.
- Keep hands and feet away from the moving parts.
- Use care when loading or unloading the machine into a trailer or truck.
- Never leave a running machine unattended.
- Before working on the mixer, stop the motor and unplug the machine.
- Do not touch parts which may be hot from operation. Allow them to cool before attempting to maintain, adjust, or service.
- Locate the pinch point areas on the machine and keep hands and feet away from these areas.
- Do not operate the machine at a voltage other than the voltage specified on the data plate of the motor.
- Do not operate the machine in standing water.
- Do not operate the machine in the rain.
- Do not use with damaged cord or plug. If machine is not working as it should, has been dropped, damaged, left outdoors, or dropped into water, return it to a service dealer.
- Do not pull or carry by cord, use cord as handle, close a door on cord, or pull cord around sharp edge or corners. Keep cord away from heated surfaces.
- Do not unplug by pulling on cord. To unplug, grasp the plug, not the cord.
- Do not handle plug or appliance with wet hands.
- Turn off all controls before unplugging.
- Use only a 3-wire extension cords with terminals and sockets for the live, neutral, and ground circuits.

- Connect the machine only to a 3-pole receptacle with live, neutral, and ground circuits.
- When using an extension cord and an in-line Ground Fault Circuit Interrupter (GFCI) device, install the GFCI device as close to the electrical source as possible.
- Ensure that the On/Off switch is rotated to the Off position before connecting the machine to the electrical source.
- The motor and motor shroud may be hot. Allow to cool before performing any service work.
- Lightning can cause severe injury or death. If lightning is seen or thunder is heard in the area, do not operate the machine; seek shelter.

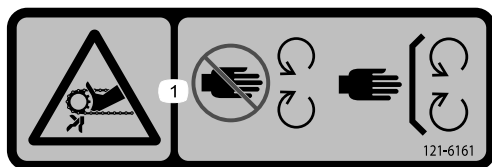
Maintenance and Storage

- Stop the motor. Wait for all movement to stop before adjusting, cleaning, or repairing.
- Unplug the machine before making any repairs.
- Clean debris from the gears, drives, drum, and motor.
- Let the motor cool before storing.
- Never service or adjust machine while it is moving.
- Always set the machine on level ground.
- Never allow untrained personnel to service the machine.
- Do not modify the electrical connectors or wiring.
- Do not connect the ground circuit of the machine to the energized circuit of the electrical source.
- Keep hands and feet away from moving parts.
- Keep all parts in good working condition and all hardware tightened. Replace all worn or damaged decals.
- Securely support any machine elements that must be raised for service work.
- Keep nuts and bolts tight. Keep equipment in good condition.
- Never tamper with safety devices.
- Stop and inspect the equipment if the machine unexpectedly stops. Make necessary repairs before restarting.
- Dispose of waste properly. Improperly disposed waste can threaten the environment.
- Store the machine indoors.
- Use only genuine Toro replacement parts to ensure that original standards are maintained.

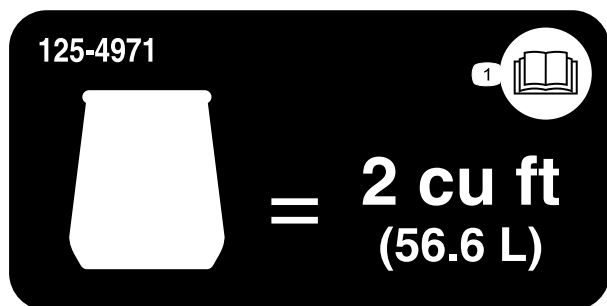

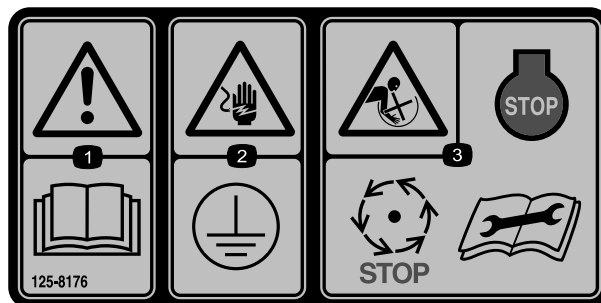

Installing the Wheels and Axle

Parts needed for this procedure:

2	Cotter pin
1	Axle rod
1	Pivot mount plate
2	Washer
2	Wheel

Procedure

Note: The pivot mount plate is included with pedestal model (68001). A spacer axle is used on the wheelbarrow only model (68003).

- Slide the axle rod into the frame of the machine; refer to [Figure 3](#).

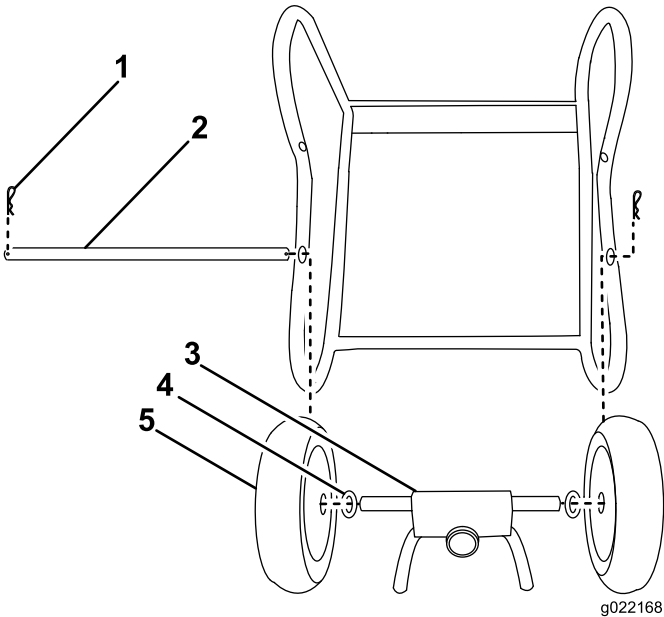

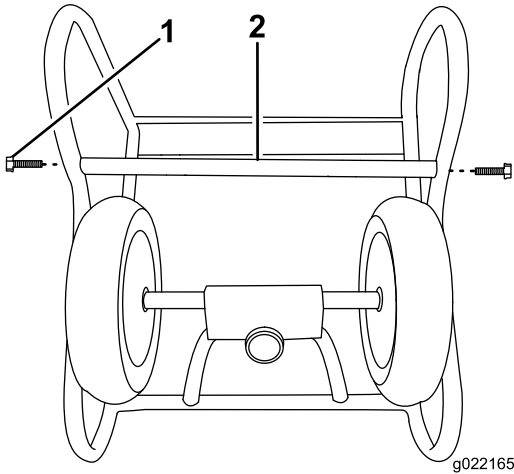

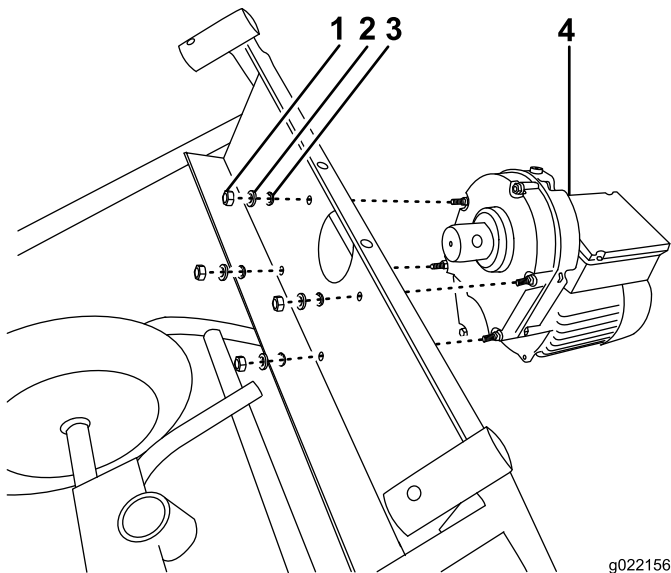

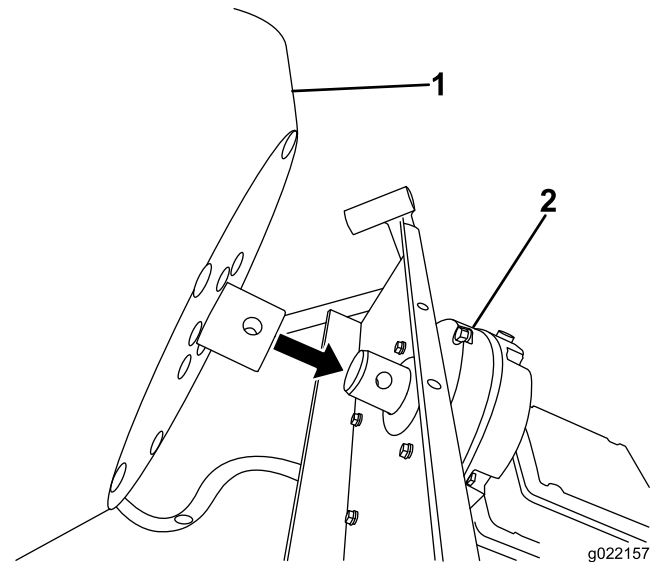

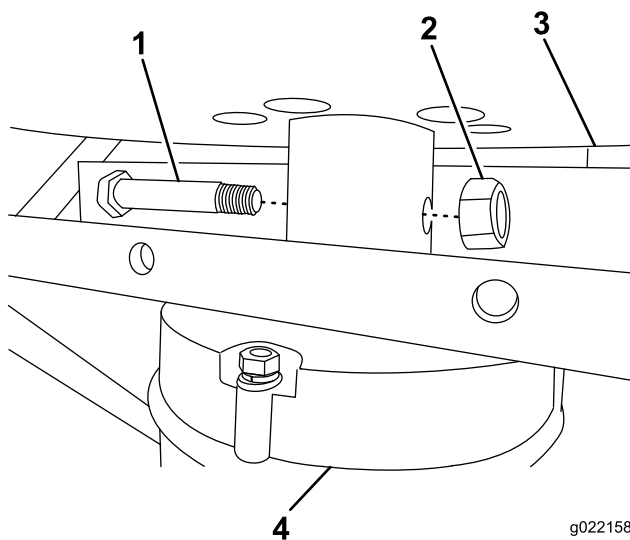

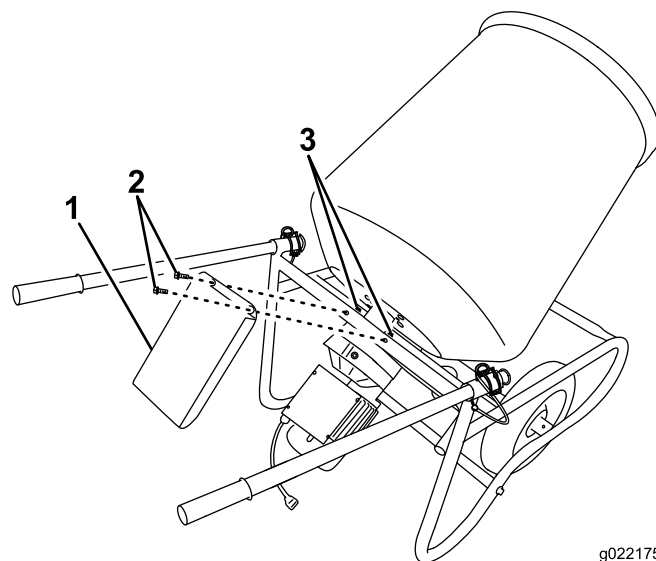

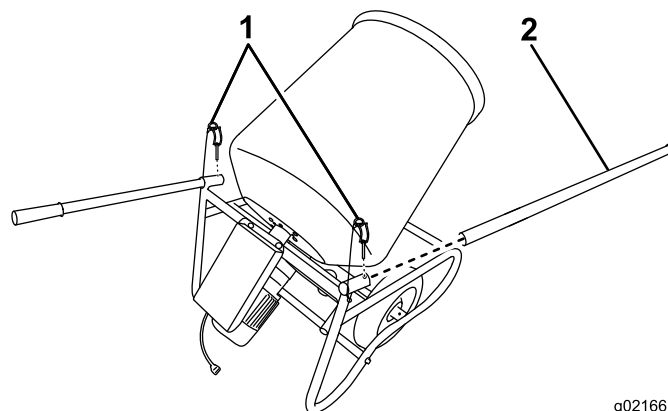

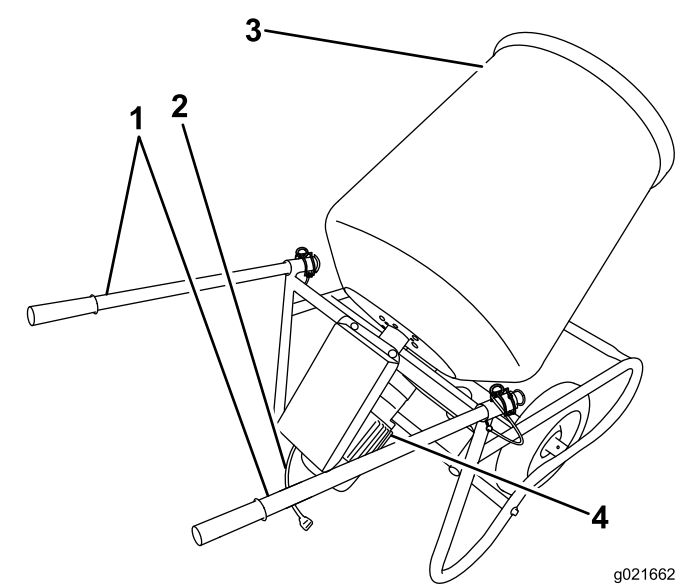

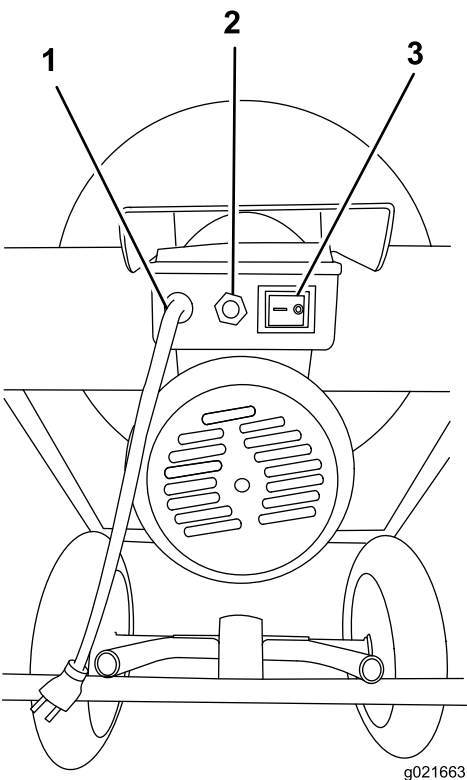

Operation

Important: Before operating, remove debris from the machine. Also, ensure that the area is clear of people and debris.

Operating the Machine

- Review all of the safety decals.
- Use a hard-hat, and eye protection. A mesh visor alone does not provide sufficient eye protection; supplement it with protective glasses.
- Ensure that you are familiar with the safety regulations and shutdown procedures described in this manual.
- Ensure that everyone, including children and animals, maintain a distance of at least 15 m (50 feet) from the machine.

Electrical Power

Connecting to a Power Source

⚠ DANGER

Contact with water while operating the product could cause electric shock, causing injury or death.

- Don't handle the plug or the machine with wet hands or while standing in water.
- Use only an extension cord recommended for outdoor use.

Note: Connect the power cord to the extension cord as shown in [Figure 12](#).

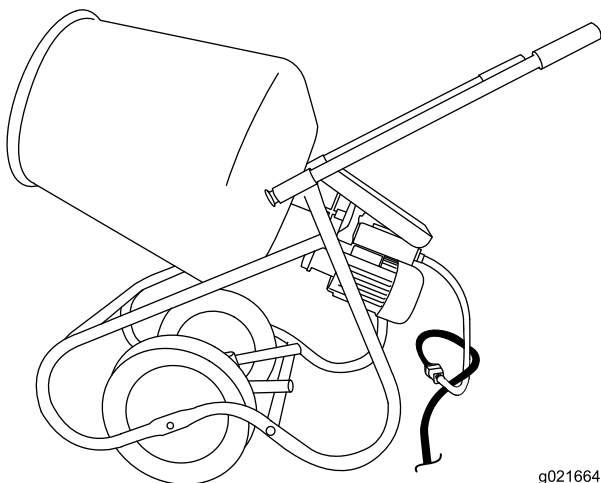

Important: Use only 3-wire extension cords with terminals and sockets for the live, neutral, and ground circuits.

Important: Only connect the machine to a 3-pole receptacle with live, neutral, and ground circuits.

Important: The connecting wires or extension cord should be as short as possible and in one piece.

Important: Only plug the machine into 115 single phase, 60-cycle, fused outlets.

Important: Do not use an extension cord over 30.4 m (100 ft) long.

Important: Only use power cords that are rated for outdoor use.

Important: Only use power cords that are rated for the motor load of the machine.

To reduce the risk of electric shock, this machine has polarized plugs (i.e., unique blade shapes and widths). Use only a polarized plug and socket that is compliant with NEMA specifications and extension cords that are UL-listed (CSA certified in Canada) and recommended for outdoor use. A polarized plug will fit in a polarized cord only one way. If the plug does not fit fully in the cord, reverse the cord. If it still does not fit, purchase a polarized extension cord. If you have a polarized extension cord and the extension cord plug does not fit fully into the wall receptacle, reverse the plug. If it still does not fit, contact a qualified electrician to install the proper outlet. Do not change the machine or extension cord plug in any way.

Important: Check the extension cord frequently during use for holes or cracks in the insulation. Do not use a

Starting and Stopping the Motor

Starting the Electric Motor

Important: Check any extension cord carefully for broken connectors, bare wires, or damaged insulation. Do not use any cord found to be in poor condition. Make sure that the extension cord is not routed through standing water and that all connections are tight. Use the shortest extension cord possible.

1. Plug the power cord into any 115 single phase, 60-cycle, fused outlet.
2. Turn the motor on by flipping the On/Off switch to the On position; refer to [Figure 11](#).

Note: The switch is marked I (On) and O (Off).

Stopping the Electric Motor

1. Turn the motor off by flipping the On/Off switch to the Off position; refer to [Figure 11](#).
2. Disconnect the power cord.

Resetting the Electric Motor

If the motor draws too much current, it will automatically shut off. In that event, follow these steps:

1. Move the On/Off switch to the Off position; refer to [Figure 11](#).
2. Unplug the machine from the power source.
3. Allow the electric motor to cool for 3 to 5 minutes.
4. In the event of a motor shutoff:
 - Check to make sure the motor fan cover is not blocked.
 - Check to see if the drum is overfilled or obstructed.

Important: When removing anything from the drum by hand, always make sure that the machine is unplugged.

- Check to make sure that the machine is plugged into a correct outlet; refer to [Connecting to a Power Source](#) (page 10).
5. Press the reset button; refer to [Figure 11](#).
6. Plug the machine into the power source.
7. Move the On/Off switch to the On position; refer to [Figure 11](#).

Note: If the motor continues to overheat after these measures have been taken, take the machine to an Authorized Service Dealer.

Using the Pedestal

Assembling the Pedestal

1. Place 2 halves of the support legs together, and insert pivot tube through the center of the legs ([Figure 13](#)).
2. Insert the locking pin through the bottom of the pivot tube ([Figure 13](#)).

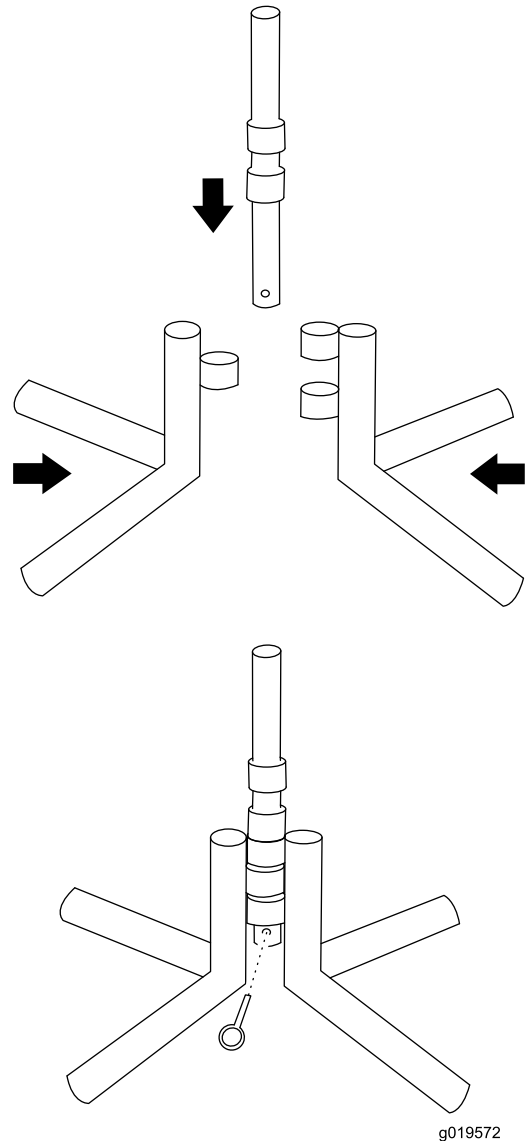

Attaching Pedestal Stand to the Machine

1. Tip the mixer, as if dumping contents, and place it squarely on the drum opening.

⚠ CAUTION

The pivot mount will rotate freely about the axle when tipping the mixer onto the drum opening. The rotating pivot mount can cause pain and injury to legs.

Stand clear of wheel axle.

2. Rotate the pivot mount plate away from the drum and onto the front stop (Figure 14).

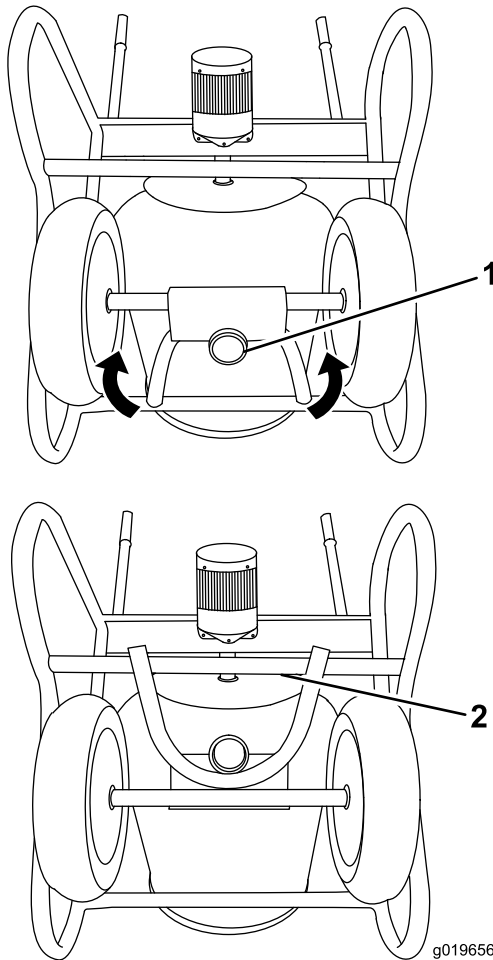

Use 2 people to tilt the mixer upright onto the stand.

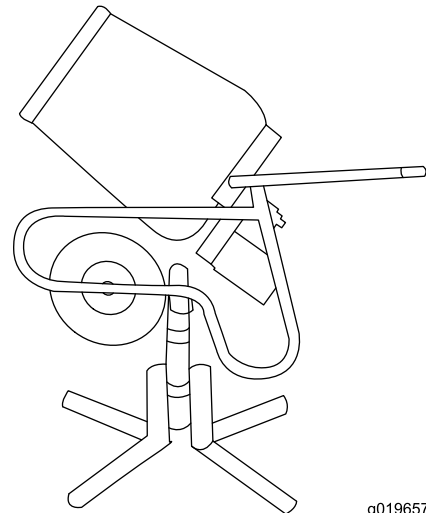
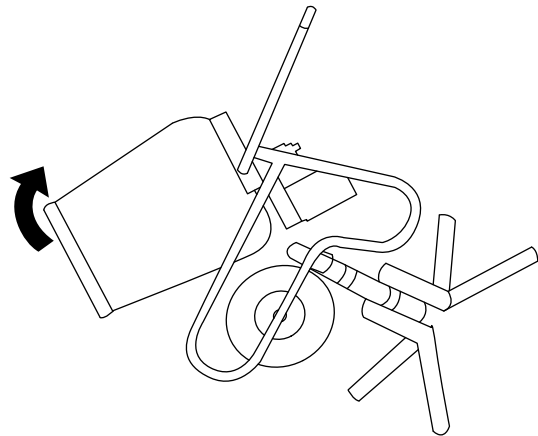
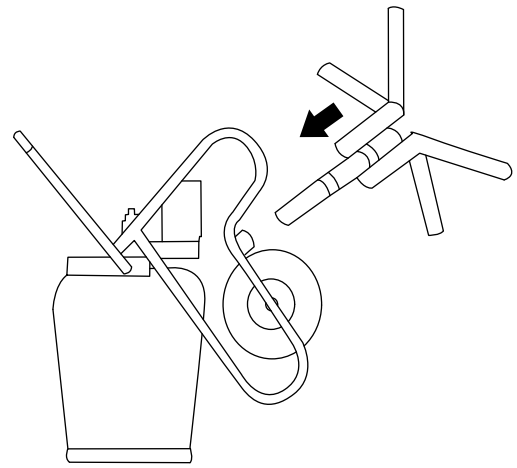

4. Move to the front of the machine and begin tilting it upright onto the stand (Figure 15).

Note: Always bend your knees and use correct posture for lifting.

⚠ WARNING

Do not tilt mixer upright onto stand on a wet, uneven, or slippery surface. Failure to follow this instruction could result in personal injury and damage to the equipment.

Set up the pedestal on flat ground with plenty of traction before attempting to tilt the machine upright onto the stand.

5. Tilt the machine to the upright mixing position.

Mixing the Material

⚠ DANGER

Eye and skin contact with concrete materials and breathing the dust involved is hazardous to your health.

- Wear a dust mask to prevent inhalation of dust while using the machine; refer to (page).
- Avoid direct contact of cement and concrete materials with skin and eyes.

Important: Do not add more material than the batch capacity for your specific machine model; refer to [Specifications \(page 9\)](#).

Note: Follow the manufacturer's instructions that are printed on the packaging of the product.

There are 4 basic ingredients in concrete:

- Sand
- Gravel
- Portland cement
- Water

Depending on the application you can use different ratios of these 4 ingredients.

There are many variations of concrete mix recipes, depending on the application. It is important to use the appropriate quantity of water. Using too little water will result in dry areas in the mix, but using too much water will result in weaker concrete. The amount of water needed will vary depending on moisture content of the sand and gravel. The mix should have a thickness similar to peanut butter.

Keep the poured concrete damp for several days to obtain proper curing. Evaporation results in weaker concrete. Concrete cures through hydration, a reaction between water and cement.

Mixing Pre-Mix Concrete

1. Turn the machine on.
2. Pour water into the drum.
3. Add the required amount of dry pre-mix concrete.
4. Allow the drum to turn while the mix reaches the appropriate consistency.
5. Pour the properly mixed concrete quickly.
6. Start next batch right away or clean out the drum immediately.

Mixing Sand, Gravel, and Cement

The typical ratio for mixing concrete is 1 part Portland cement, 2 parts sand, and 3 parts gravel.

1. Turn the machine on.
2. Pour water into the drum.
3. Add the required amount of gravel.
4. Add the required amount of Portland cement.
5. Add the required amount of sand.
6. Allow the drum to turn while the mix reaches the appropriate consistency.
7. Pour the properly mixed concrete quickly.
8. Add the water and gravel to the drum to begin next batch and loosen up mix left by the previous batch.

Note: Adding water and gravel before cement and sand allows the mix left in the drum from the previous batch to tumble off the drum and paddles and into the next batch.

Maintenance

Recommended Maintenance Schedule(s)

Maintenance Service Interval	Maintenance Procedure
After each use	• Remove debris from the machine. • Clean the machine.
Every 200 hours	• Drain and replace the oil in the gearbox.

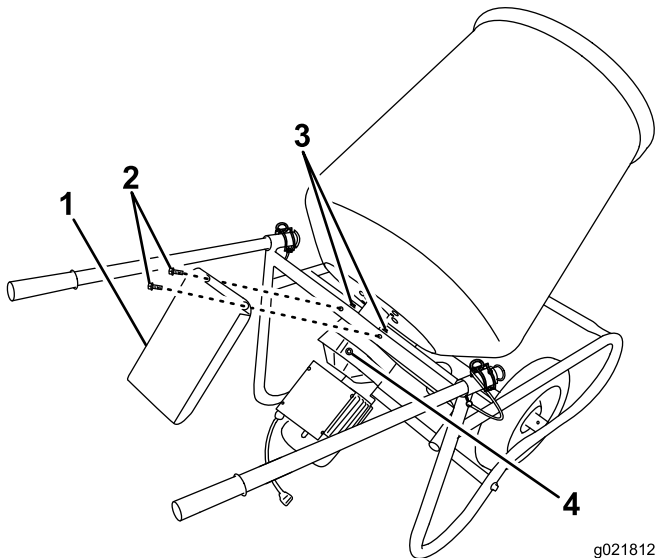

2. Remove the oil plug (Figure 16).
3. Drain the oil.

Note: Carefully flip the machine upsidedown to a waiting oil pan for the oil to drain. When finished, flip the machine right-side up.

4. Pour 0.2 L (8.0 oz) of oil into the gearbox.

Note: Use Mobil 1 LS 75W–90 Gear Lubricant or equivalent.

5. Install the oil plug and motor cover.

Cleaning

Coat the drum and frame with a concrete preventative. This will make cleaning the machine easier.

Regular cleaning and washing will increase the lifespan of the machine. Clean the machine directly after use, before the cement hardens.

Use care when using a high-pressure sprayer, because it can damage warning decals, instruction signs, and the motor.

Wash the machine with mild detergent and water. Do not get the motor wet.

Storage

For storage over 30 days, prepare the machine as follows:

1. Remove dirt and grime from the external parts of the entire machine, especially the motor. Clean dirt and concrete from the inside and outside of the drum; refer to [Cleaning \(page 14\)](#).
2. Check and tighten all bolts, nuts, and screws. Repair or replace any part that is damaged.
3. Paint all scratched or bare metal surfaces. Paint is available from your Authorized Service Dealer.
4. Inspect the electrical cord and electrical connectors for damage.
5. Store the machine in a clean, dry garage or storage area.
6. Cover the machine to protect it and keep it clean.

Troubleshooting
